# What Is Proposition J and Why Does It Matter?

The "CodeNEXT" citizen petition initiative will be on the ballot this November as Proposition J. If Austin voters approve Proposition J, as the initiative states "there shall be both a waiting period and voter approval by election before CodeNEXT (or any subrevisions of the City's land legally effective". A "yes"

"Propostion J is prodevelopment laws) is wote on Proposition J means voters will have to approve CodeNEXT or the next CodeNEXT; a "no" vote means council may enact a comprehensive land code revision without voter approval, as is currently the law. Proposition J gives Austinites a choice when it comes to comprehensive revisions of our land-development laws.

There has been a lot of misinformation over the last few weeks about Proposition J. Here are a few of the most common myths being spread about Proposition J, along with the facts that Austin voters need to know:

MYTH: CodeNEXT is dead, so Proposition J is irrelevant.

FACT: While CodeNEXT was "suspended" by the Council this August and the brand-name "CodeNEXT" may be gone, Austin's mayor and city council have expressed a desire to "reboot" or "restart" the controversial land-redevelopment plan after this November's election. If Austin residents pass Proposition J, they will be given the right to decide whether or not that reboot becomes law. The same will hold true for any comprehensive revision of our land-development laws, regardless of how the City of Austin chooses to package it.

MYTH: Proposition J is anti-growth.

FACT: Proposition J is neither pro-growth nor anti-growth. Proposition J is prodemocracy. Proposition J simply calls for voter approval of comprehensive, once-ina-generation revisions of Austin's land-development laws.

MYTH: Proposition J calls for a three-year waiting period before changes can be made to our land code, delaying new developments.

# **Howdy Neighbor**

Election time is upon us! This November there are all sorts of important elections to be decided on at the federal and state levels, but the things that have the greatest impact on our daily lives are often decided locally. This year there are many propositions on the ballot. Props A-G are bond propostions, and H and I are amendments to the city charter. There is a plethora of information about those online and in the media. However, the last two, J and K are more hotly contested, and the dividing lines are less clear.

Mayor Adler has called them "a joke". This seems to be his normal reaction when thousands of citizens sign a petition he disagrees with or questions his stance on things in our neighborhoods. I'm here to tell you that these are no joke. As a matter of fact, they are quite serious and could prevent him and his real estate developer buddies from maintaining a stranglehold over city government.

Prop J would require a citywide election on the next iteration of CodeNEXT or whatever the new name they come up with for our land development code rewrite. Adler claims that land development codes are too complicated for us simple citizens to understand, and these decisions are best left to developers and city staff. If you've ever dealt with either, you can decide if they are that much smarter than you and I!

Prop K calls for an independent audit of our city's expenditures. Despite misleading ballot language, it could potentially save our city millions of dollars and lead to better policies. The best argument I've heard against it is that we already have audit reports that demonstrate massive bad actions and waste in city government that have been shelved because of the mayor's discomfort. It's your call if that is a reason not to have increased transparency.





At our October 8th meeting we will have folks familiar with these propositions on hand to explain them in further detail and answer your questions. I encourage you to bring tough questions and see for yourself if you think they are worthy of your vote.

The only other city item on the ballot in our area will be the mayoral election. There are a number of people on the ballot for the position. The most mainstream candidates that have put their hat in the ring are Laura Morrison, a former City Council member, engineer and strident ally against CodeNEXT and Todd Phelps, a small business owner, musician and fiscal hawk.

I encourage you to learn more about the candidates and most importantly - GO VOTE!

I'll leave you with the best news I can think of: FREE BEER!

FACT: Proposition J does call for a waiting period before any comprehensive revision of our land-development laws can be implemented, but we expect that waiting period to last one year or less. Proposition J's waiting period, according to the initiative, "is to ensure voters can learn about the [council's] proposed comprehensive revisions and elect council members with sufficient time to amend or reject the prior council's comprehensive revisions." During the waiting period, the Council and staff have the option to implement interim measures and pilot projects. Proposition J applies only to once-in-a-generation revisions of Austin's land-development laws like CodeNEXT, not specific development projects, incremental changes to the law, or individual programs like flooding mitigation and affordable-housing initiatives.

MYTH: Land-development laws are too complicated for voters to weigh in on.



FACT: Austin residents are capable of voting on complicated things, and they do so every time they are asked to weigh in on bond packages, charter amendments, and other big issues. Our land-development laws have just as much impact on their homes and neighborhoods, if not more. Proposition J simply calls for a public vote on any comprehensive revision of those laws—it doesn't call for residents to rewrite those laws or shape them in any way.


MYTH: Proposition J is supported only by affluent homeowners.

### **Cap Metro Double Track Update**

Rail crews have been focused on the completion of the track wall on the north (east) side of the right-of-way. This is nearing completion and grade preparation work and ballast delivery will be commencing. Base material will be brought in and compacted much like the bed preparation that took place on the south (west) side of the right-of-way. This work is scheduled for the later part of September and early October. Machinery noise and some dust can be expected. Track welding and tie installation will be taking place in October and November, most of which can be done during the week. All construction is still scheduled to be completed by the end of the year.

**Sue B. Craig**, a bright light in the Crestview neighborhood, passed away on September 19th. She will be fondly remembered.











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
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
